The Corporation is organized and operated for the support of wildlife conservation, the preservation and improvement of wildlife habitat, and education regarding wildlife, wildlife habitat and environmental matters related thereto.	
This includes cedar encroachment, soil erosion, water contamination, pollution (including light and noise pollution) habitat fragmentation, native species improvement and education of the public (especially new landowners) as to why these are important to the well being of nature and the natural balances of the habitat. Great importance is placed on neighbors getting to know each other and working together on common goals to accomplish much more than they could alone, such as reducing habitat fragmentation, which is considered the greatest threat to wildlife. Meetings are held as friendly gatherings, often with food and drink, to foster such relationships.	
Programs are presented by recognized experts in their fields and cover all sorts of topics related to rural land ownership and management. Tax deductible donations are accepted from both government and private sources. Funds are used to implement the purposes stated above. Additionally the Association sponsors other organizations that provide programs of interest to our members.
